Virginia Beach Bus Trip Instructions

Daria and Bruce would like to thank you for participating in this fundraising venture. We are looking forward to spending time together.

We are hoping to make this a successful trip so please feel free to invite friends to join us. The minimum number of participants is 30. If you need any flyers, I can send them to you through the mail or by email. Diamond Tours has suggested we post flyers in churches, at our Masonic Lodges and even to drop some off at gatehouses of senior developments.

- 1. Please make deposit check payable to Diamond Tours, Inc and mail directly to me: *Diane Schmolze 1114 Leilani Drive*, *Forked River*, *NJ 08731*. Payment in full for each participant must be received by 7/13/2021.
- 2. Travel Insurance is highly recommended, but optional; it is \$69.00 per person. To make record keeping easier, I would request that you make that payment individually by credit card via the internet: www.travelconfident.com and click on the sign up now button. You will be prompted to fill in information. YOU MUST INCLUDE THE TOUR #1751977. IF YOU CHOOSE INSURANCE IT MUST BE PURCHASED WITHIN 14 DAYS OF YOUR INITIAL DEPOSIT. ONCE YOUR PAYMENT HAS BEEN RECEIVED BY THE INSURANCE COMPANY, YOU WILL RECEIVE A COPY OF THE INSURANCE POLICY. If internet payment is not possible, please send me your insurance check at the time you send me your deposit. This check should me made payable to: TRAVEL INSURED INTERNATIONAL, INC. and I will forward Insurance checks to the company.

- 3. Please provide me with who you are rooming with. I have paperwork to fill out for rooms and since we have a casino stop on our tour, they now have new requirements regarding passenger information. This includes full name and address, email address (if you have email,) and date of birth.
- 4. Any dietary restrictions you have, please tell your server at scheduled restaurants.
- 5. **GRATUITIES.** I will provide envelopes for each passenger for the tip for the bus driver. It is suggested that \$2.00/day or \$10.00/person is the customary amount. I will collect the envelopes on the last day of our trip and present the entire amount to the bus driver. This is a suggestion and the minimum amount. If you feel that more is appropriate, please adjust accordingly. There will be one step-on guide at Williamsburg and \$1.00 \$2.00 per person is suggested. I will provide envelopes for the guide and collect them during the tour.
- 6. **IMPORTANT:** You will be required to sign a waiver stating that you have had the covid vaccine. Please make a copy of your vaccination record and send it to me along with the waiver. I will handle getting all paperwork to Diamond Tours. This way I will have a complete record for all passengers. Let's all stay safe. You will not be processed unless the company has this verification. (Note: I will also make an extra copy to bring with me just in case you forget your original. You should usually carry it when you travel.)





Dear Eastern Star Community,

Since my last writing in January, an extraordinary amount of hard work and success has occurred here at the New Jersey Eastern Star Home. The entire team, across all shifts, has risen to the multitude of challenges that the year has presented. I will spotlight some of the major projects and accomplishments as they are too numerous to mention all of them.

Unfortunately, COVID-19 has not yet become a thing of the past, however the Home has been COVID free for several months now. We have continued to be vigilant in screening all staff and visitors to our Home as well as testing of new patients and any who have declined the vaccine. We continue to utilize all PPE and safety protocols. Three vaccination clinics were held, and we continue to offer a choice of vaccine to new patients, residents, and staff. We will remain vigilant in our practices against this virus to maximize everyone's safety.

Amidst the challenge of COVID-19, the Home experienced an environmental emergency, a flood due to a burst water pipe on our subacute unit. Our disaster response plan was immediately initiated. The entire team responded swiftly and professionally, and residents were relocated to unaffected areas of the Home. Much water damage was sustained on our subacute wing, and within 10 weeks, the entire unit was remediated, refreshed, and reopened for business.

Our unit is better than ever! Even though this unexpected event occurred, I could not be prouder of the response by our dedicated staff. In particular, our maintenance Director Pete Zoesch coordinated work being performed by numerous vendors that were performing repairs simultaneously. This was a monumental task which required the cooperation and teamwork of all departments (Nursing, Finance, Admissions, Housekeeping, Infection Control, Social Services, Administration) to render the unit operational again. After the flood, came the winter freeze and snowstorms, and we also conquered these weather-related challenges that came our way from a staffing and physical plant perspective.

During this unprecedented time, the Department of Health also mandated that all long-term care facilities implement an electronic medical record (EMR) system and discontinue the use of paper charts. Needless to say, we have been very busy with installing WIFI in the original portion of the building, selecting a software system, purchasing computer hardware, train-

ing employees and physicians, and finally launching the system in June! Another huge milestone achieved for NJESH!

In April, the NJ Department of Health arrived, unannounced, for our annual recertification survey. Due to the pandemic, a full annual survey had not been conducted since June 2019. am happy to report that for the first time, NJESH has achieved a deficiency free health inspection! This is a coveted achievement obtained by very few facilities. The team of surveyors spent an entire week onsite observing every aspect of resident and patient care from meals, medications, rehabilitation therapy, cleanliness, staff interactions, infection control protocols, resident rights, just to name a few areas. This Deficiency Free Health Inspection directly affects our CMS Five Star Rating by increasing the inspections rating. This rating is important to the facility as consumers routinely use these ratings to select a facility for their loved ones.

A concerted effort has been made to advertise our deficiency free survey and share this wonderful news with potential patients and residents. We have begun posting articles in several online local newspapers. Who Was Wilfred Parsels?



Wil was born on February 5, 1939, to Myrtle (Benner) and Wilfred Parsels. His Grandfather, Charles Benner, was the Justice of the Peace and Tax Collector in Westville, NJ. His Mother worked at the Tax Office. Wil's parents were active and dedicated members of Blessed Hope Community Church, a strict non-sectarian church, where his Maternal Grandmother was a long-time Treasurer and his Father a long-time Sunday School Leader. His Mother died at age 42 of pancreatic cancer.

Wil grew up living across the street from a school which meant access to a baseball field. Every day he and his friends waited for his father to come home from work to hit balls to them It was the beginning of his love for baseball. In High School he played 1st Base (his father and grandfather never missed a game). After High School, Wil worked at RCA in Moorestown. They not only had a bowling league that he enjoyed, but they were in an Industrial Baseball League which he loved. Later, he played 1st Base while stationed in France with the Army.

A year later Wil went to a dance with his friends. In the 1950's there were lie bands, a great place to meet girls. Wil and a group of his friends decided that whoever lost would have to ask the miserable girl to dance. That girl would become his wife Joanne for 60 years. Two years later,



they bought their first home. Wil was attending Temple University for Mechanical Engineering. Just two months later he received greetings from the US Army: basic training in Fort Dix, then transferred to Fort Jackson, S.C., and then to Toul France, for a year, where he got to ski and go to the Grand Prix. He took up photography as a hobby, was a bartender at the Officers' Club, and played baseball for the post team against Army and Air Force units and other service teams. Returning from the Army, his job at RCA was gone, due to a major lay-off. That finished his baseball career!

So, then he volunteered as a Little League coach, and he loved it!

In 1964, with the birth of his first niece, Wil's portrayal of Santa Claus began. Wil loved playing Santa Claus for many, many years, for grand nieces and nephews and Eastern Star Chapters we well. He was very heavily invested in his nieces and nephews, taking them to amusement parks to ride the largest roller coasters, spending days at the beach, teaching them golf, playing golf and tennis, and of course, taking them to Phillies and Eagles Games.

In 1968, Joanne joined the Eastern Star and in 1972 Will joined the Masons in Haddonfield Lodge. He had no idea of any members of his family being Masons. May years later his Grandmother told him the his Grandfather Benner was a Mason at Mantua Lodge and a Shiner. Will soon joined the Eastern Star. For many, many years was the 9th District Photographer at Installations and special nights. (He also did wedding photography). e was an excellent ritualist and loved doing the Ritualistic work, and also was deeply involved with Chapter and Grand Chapter By-Laws.

Wil served Haddonfield Lodge for 10 years as Secretary. Although the position was unexpected, after he settled in, he enjoyed the work. When Ocean City Lodge needed a Secretary, he agreed to serve there. Wil was a member of the Consistory in Collingswood, and was honored to serve as Grand Chaplain in Grand Lodge for Bob Miller.

In 1973-74 Wil as installed as Worthy Patron with his wife in Haddonfield Chapter. At the time the 9th District had 19 Chapters. He served as Worthy Patron in several Chapters: Haddonfield, Haddon Heights, Oaklyn, Collingwood, and Ocean City. In 1988 Marlene Hoffman asked him to serve with her as Most Worthy Grand Patron for 1990-91; they had a wonderful year. Afterward, Wil felt it necessary to pay back to this wonderful Organization, so he ran for the OES Home Board where he served as President for 2 years. He served Grand Chapter in various positions, but his favorite was Chairman of Jurisprudence for several Grand Matrons.

After returning from the Military with no job, Wil as employed by many companies, General Electric, Siemens, etc., but he also did drawings for a small conveyer company. He was offered a Sales Job with the Company, was promoted to Plant Manager and then his career changed. He was offered a job as Vice President to another conveyer Company. And then another. His engineering background gave him the ability to draw a conveyer in front of the customer, which his competition could not do. He loved both careers.

After, being retired for 15 years, Wil decided he wanted a job, and after completing a series of computer applications, he was hired at Dick's Sporting Goods in the Golf Department. He absolutely loved the job and the people!

Who, then was Wil Parsels?

He was a dedicated family man, Mason, and Eastern Star, loyal to his country and his work. He led a life filled with joy, and people that he loved so much. We all miss him and his jokes!

The Grand Chapter's CAPS program is continuing to support many worthwhile organizations throughout the state. We were able to supply hats, blankets, scarves, quilts, etc. to several organizations. Unfortunately during the pandemic many organizations were not accepting donations.

During the past two years many hours were dedicated to crocheting/knitting thousands of caps, blankets, prayer squares, mittens, booties, pillowcases and scarves. We even had blankets made for animal shelters.

The donations were sent to various organizations such as: hospitals, Churches, Cancer Centers, Food Pantries and animal welfare associations.

In addition to the NICU units at various hospitals, we found additional needs for the Caps. Not only were preemie caps made, larger caps for cancer patients were also requested. We now make several sizes of hats to distribute to these various organizations.

For the 2019-2021 Grand Chapter years over 7,700 caps were distributed; along with over 600 blankets, booties, mittens, pillowcases and prayer squares. Over 13,250 items were donated during the past two years.



On behalf of our Board of Directors, myself, and most importantly our Veteran and Service dog teams, we thank you for your generous donation of hand crocheted blankets which we received in March 2020. The blankets are beautiful and the dogs that don't chew and eat them (lol), enjoyed them. We are honored, greatly appreciative & truly blessed that you chose Semper Fido as the recipient of your support.

Semper Fido, Inc. exists solely on the monetary & in-kind donations made by people & organizations like you. We are staffed by a six (6) member, all-volunteer board of directors and have no salaried employees. Approximately 98% of our monetary donations are used to cover the \$45,000 per service team cost; this includes everything from initial adoption fees, spaying/neutering if necessary, boarding, feeding, veterinary, and all training/equipment costs before and after they are partnered with their veteran. The remaining 1-2% is used to purchase nominal items, t-shirts, hoodies, etc. which we sell to help raise additional monies. Upon completion of their training, an approximately six (6) months/six-hundred (600) man hours long period of time, the dogs are adopted to their veteran at absolutely no cost to them as their new lifetime partner.

Founded in November of 2010 and incorporated in February of 2011, to date we have proudly graduated (36) service dog teams. We currently have two (2) veterans and two (2) rescue dogs in training. We train and provide service dogs to those Honorably Discharged & combat veterans diagnosed with Post-traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) & mild to moderate Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI). Only homeless shelter or surrendered dogs are accepted into our program, giving them a second chance in life. For all of us at Semper Fido, Inc. the profound difference we've seen in these brave men and women who served their country honorably and sacrificed so much for us, helping them find their "new normal" has been one of the most important and gratifying accomplishments of our lives!

Please know that your donation will help us save the life of an unwanted dog and improve the life of a brave veteran.
