Which "RITY" do you need to work on?

I ask when you return to your chapter this fall, return with a heart full of love and excitement. I urge you to try new things, visit other chapters, encourage and support each other, share and invite your friends to open functions, talk it up, but most importantly. . . 

The New Jersey Eastern Star Home continues to expand its reputation as a quality care provider. We are working to increase our business connections with area professionals as an opportunity to serve common clients. We have recently partnered with University Orthopaedic Associates in Somerset as their orthopaedic surgeons are increasing the number of surgeries they are doing at our local hospital, RWJ Barnabus at Somerset. Additionally, we have been exchanging information and service opportunities with several new stand-alone Assisted Living Facilities in our geographic area to discuss serving patients that would benefit from the care and services provided by both facilities, obviously at different points in time.

The Nursing Home/Rehab business continues to be very competitive in our market area. We must be diligent in maintaining high standards in the provision of rehab services, nursing care, activities, quality personnel, first-class accommodations and marketing initiatives.

The Nursing Home industry has been undergoing massive regulatory changes, the most significant revisions/additions since the early nineties. Effective October of 2016, we have been undergoing a three (3) phase compliance requirement that effects a broad range of nursing home services including,

but not limited to:resident's rights, pharmacy, behavioral healthcare, infection control and trauma care. These changes have required new policy and program development. Phases 1 and 2 have already been implemented. The last round of changes will be implemented by November of 2019.

It is important to note that although we have contracts with the above stated companies, all plans within a given company may not be applicable to a stay at New Jersey Eastern Star Home; therefore, if you need services, please contact the Director of Admissions at 908-722-4140.

In closing, I'd like to extend many thanks to the Chapters, Charity Foundation and numerous individuals who have been sending in donations to help us with the purchasing of recliners and televisions for our residents!!! We are well on our way to furnishing many resident rooms with a comfortable place to rest, relax and recoup as they "recline".




District 39 Hosts NJ OES Home Residents at Picnic

The Grand Chapter's CAPS program is continuing to support many worthwhile organizations throughout the state.

This past year many hours were dedicated to crocheting/knitting thousands of caps, blankets, prayer squares, mittens, booties, pillowcases and scarves. We even had blankets made for animal shelters.

The donations were sent to various organizations such as: hospitals, Churches, Cancer Centers, Food Pantries and animal welfare associations. A special request was received from the Lehigh Valley Hospital, in Easton, Pennsylvania. They had a special request for pastel colored receiving blankets for babies in the NICU who would not make it through child birth. These blankets were used so that the mothers and fathers were able to hold their baby one last time, and they were able to keep the blankets in memory of their child. We were able to provide Lehigh Valley will a dozen of these blankets.

In addition to the NICU units at various hospitals, we found additional needs for the Caps. Not only were preemie caps made, larger caps for cancer/aid patients were also requested. We now make several sizes of hats to distribute to these various organizations.

For the 2017-2018 Grand Chapter year over 5,000 caps were distributed; along with over 400 blankets, booties, mittens, pillowcases and prayer squares.
